Vacancy for a Parish Clerk – Part Time

The Whitehouse Community Council is seeking to appoint a highly motivated, self-starting and proactive Parish Clerk, with the relevant experience and qualities to undertake the varied responsibilities of this key position. The role is part-time and will require a flexible approach to working hours to fit in with the business of the Community Council. The successful candidate will be expected to demonstrate leadership, administrative, IT, financial and interpersonal skills. COUNCIL TAX BUDGET & PRECEPT FOR 2021 / 2022

What is the 'Precept' and what is it used for?

The 'Precept' is the Community Council's share of the annual Council tax bill. The Community Council prepares a budget of income and expenditure for the new tax year and forwards that on to Milton Keynes Council, who then collects the tax on behalf of the Community Council. The 'Precept' is converted into an amount per Council Tax Band, that is then included in the annual Council Tax bill.

How is the precept for the next year calculated?

The Whitehouse Community Council has prepared a budget for money that we are going to need for the upcoming tax year. This is then divided by the number of households in the Community and for Whitehouse in 2021 / 22, the tax base (amount of households) used for the calculation is **1,048**.

How much will we pay more in the next tax year?

Being well aware of the current challenging economic situation due to COVID-19, the Whitehouse Community Council has planned a budget that will allow us to deliver a variety of services to the Whitehouse community, whilst focusing on the community's limited resources. Through careful planning, we have prepared a budget that will not require an increase for 2021 / 22. The Band D tax equivalent therefore remains at £58.00 per annum, which is a 0% increase from the previous tax year.

The Whitehouse Community Council's 2021-2022 budget was agreed at the Full Council meeting held on 9th December 2020. The agenda and papers for meetings can be found on our website at https://whitehouse-pc.gov.uk/

Overall, the Whitehouse Community Council's budget for 2021-2022 is £ 60,784.

We are also including money in our budget to prepare for the new allotments that will be made available during 2022 / 23, but some initial cost will be required for the planning & management of community interest in the new allotment plots.

The Council takes a cautious approach to our expenditure plans and have ensured sufficient reserves as a sensible contingency for these uncertain times. We will continue to make use of the Council's quarterly surveys, to ensure we stay in tune with the "Voice of our Community".

Characteristics: They are traditionally red with white markings. Bulls usually weigh 2000—2500 lbs.




AYRESHIRE

BRAHMAN


Origin: USA




127 online and 2 manually completed survey responses were received and included in the analysis. (Some surveys had to be excluded unfortunately as they were not completed in full).

Q1 Which "development area" are you currently living in?




Q2 What is your current view of the "state of the estate", e.g. cleanliness, quality of living, etc.?




Q4 2020 SURVEY RESULTS WITH SOME KEY REPLIES INDICATED (PAGE 2 of 3)


Q6 Would you like to see locally managed landscaping of the entire Whitehouse estate?

Q8 What are the age ranges of people living in your household?






Q11 Please rate the shops below in order of preference with number 1 being your most preferred through to number 9 being your least preferred.

Demand Responsive Transport (DRT) - All change!



Since the pandemic began, use of public transport ("ridership") has changed. The Department for Transport stats show that during the first lockdown, rail use dropped as low as 4% of typical, and bus use dipped to 11%, recovering only to 47% on average in October and into November 2020. With buses having under half of the pre-pandemic ridership and a forecast that will not be recovering any time soon, "the way things are done" needs to change.

Enter Demand Responsive Transport (DRT) - Trialling the No 28 Route

While Milton Keynes was growing back in the 1960s, the population was too spread out for scheduled bus services, but residents could call up and order a minibus – "Dial-a-Bus", which would then group people together and go. There is a similar challenge being faced today as current bus use and subsidies are unsustainable.

Milton Keynes Council has been looking to our heritage, and the Milton Keynes Vision for Inspiration and came up with DRT - Demand Responsive Transport – an updated version of "Dial-a-Bus"

From April 2021, MK Council wants to introduce DRT to replace unprofitable bus routes.

DRT is a (12 person) minibus service that comes to meet you. Designed to pick up at existing bus stops, it can divert "off route" if needed. You can book your journey via an app or over the phone and you will be matched with other passengers heading in the same direction within a maximum "wait time".

There is a current trial of DRT covering the number 28 route (which travels along Dansteed Way). All single trips cost £2.50, but the service is free for Older Persons and Disabled Persons or Bus Pass holders. For live help creating an account on your smartphone, you can call 01908 410305 and if you are a Bus Pass holder, please call 01908 252526 (lines are open Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays from 9am to 5pm, and on Wednesdays from 10am to 5pm) to book a ride.

Anything learnt during the trial period will be included in the main roll-out.


In the future, DRT would also feed into the proposed mass rapid transport "MRT" network. There would be several hub "stations" around MK where high speed buses or trams can whizz people to major destinations.

What about now?

We would love to hear your comments or concerns about how this might impact or benefit you.

Come along to our Council meeting on 18 March 2021 to hear from your Ward Councillor, Jenny Wilson-Marklew (also Milton Keynes Council's Cabinet Member with responsibility for Transport) who will be presenting the scheme with an opportunity to ask questions about future bus services and accessibility.

Whitehouse Surgery Update



Whitehouse Surgery is located within the Whitehouse Health Centre. Opening on the 1st December, the team started with zero patients and we now have over 2,000 fully registered patients and risingthis is despite opening in the middle of a Pandemic, Christmas holidays, a second National Lockdown and the launch of the COVID Vaccination Programme!

As we find ourselves moving into our third month of operation, we wanted to take a breath and share our most recent challenge, the roll out of the COVID Vaccination Programme.

Due to the location of Whitehouse and the huge amount of parking we are lucky to have, we stepped forward as the nominated hub for our Primary Care network, working with the other three established Medical Centres, all of which are neighbours on the western development area of Milton Keynes.





For eight consecutive days we opened our

doors to over 4,000 visitors, numerous clinicians, 38+ wonderful volunteers, endless teas, coffees and biscuits and Whitehouse Health Centre even featured on the front page of the MK Citizen.

We had horizontal rain, snow, ice and sunshine, but a fantastic team spirit kept everyone going.

The positive patient feedback was overwhelming, from the marshalling of the car park to the almost non-existent queue for the vaccine itself (we often ran 15 minutes ahead of appointment times) to the waiting room volunteers, who made each and every one of us extremely proud.

In total, as a collective of four surgeries, by the time this article is printed we will have given over 4,500 vaccinations on site and nearly 350 vaccines to local care home residents and housebound patients. As a healthcare team and combined with incredible community spirit, together we have vaccinated over 70% of the government-approved groups in our areas.

There is still much to do with the vaccination programme and while we await our next delivery of vaccines and start planning our next clinics, Stony, Watling Vale and Hilltops Medical Centres and Whitehouse Surgery would like to pass on our thanks to all the wonderful volunteers, to local residents and building contractors that gave endless directions to visitors and to Whitehouse Primary School for the loan of waiting room chairs.

Stay safe everyone.
